Course Description

Topics will be chosen from fundamental ideas in enumerative combinatorics and graph theory. The course culminates in individual study of a particular advanced topic from the text.

Grading Scale

Grade cutoffs for A, B, C, and D are 90%, 80%, 70%, and 60%, respectively. The additional “+” and “-” grades will be awarded according to the following example: B+ (87-89%), B (83-86%), B- (80-82%).

Course Structure and Expectations

- Prior to class, students will complete the required reading.
- Students will meet three times week to discuss the reading and exercises.
- Students will submit clear, rigorous solutions to homework assignments. Collaboration is encouraged, but each student must submit his/her own solutions.
- Each student will select a different advanced topic to explore individually. The results of this exploration will be reflected in detail as a written report and presented as a conference-style talk at the Doane College Symposium in Undergraduate Mathematics.
